44 **2. Ethics Reminder**

Chair Steve Schewel read the Ethics Reminder and asked if there were any known conflicts of
interest with respect to matters coming before the MPO Board and requested that if there were any

51 4. Public Comments

- 52 Chair Steve Schewel asked if there were any members of the public signed up to speak. There
- 53 were no members of the public signed up to speak during the meeting.

54 **<u>5. Directives to Staff</u>**

55 Ellen Reckhow asked the Local Planning Agency (LPA) Staff to consult with North Carolina

- 56 Department of Transportation (NCDOT) staff about signage on NC 147 in light of the construction of the
- 57 East End Connector. Ellen Reckhow stated that signage needs to begin in Orange County at the I-85/NC
- 58 147 split in order to help people to make good choices and therefore relieve congestion. Felix Nwoko
- 59 stated that NCDOT has already considered a signage plan, but that the LPA Staff will consult with them to
- 60 make sure that it extends to the split.
- 61 Barry Jacobs stated that there were no signs in the area that state the distance to Greensboro,
- 62 Burlington, or Hillsborough. Ed Harrison stated that such signs are present past Greensboro, and asked
- 63 the LPA Staff to look into addressing this issue.

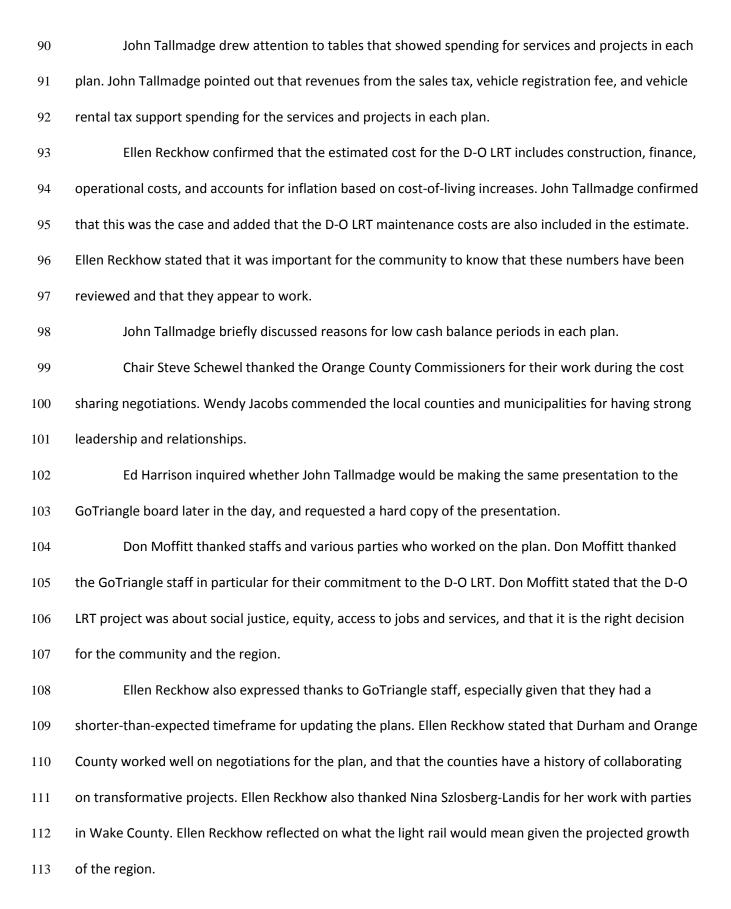
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68 6. Durham County and Orange County Transit Plan Updates

69 John Tallmadge and Geoff Green, GoTriangle

70	John Tallmadge discussed changes that were made to the draft Durham County and Orange
71	County Transit Plans in order to produce the final plans, primarily the cost-sharing agreement and
72	making sure that both counties would have sufficient balances to pursue priorities such as the Wake-
73	Durham Commuter Rail project and additional bus service for Orange County. John Tallmadge also
74	reviewed minor changes that were made when the plans were adopted by the Durham County Board of
75	Commissioners and the Orange County Board of Commissioners, and asked the MPO Board to adopt the
76	changes in their motions for each of the plans.
77	John Tallmadge stated that a change made during the Orange County Commissioners' adoption
78	of the plan was the deletion of a specific reference to optional cost cutting measures in relation to the
79	Hamilton and Woodmont stations in Orange County. Ed Harrison pointed out that Woodmont is in
80	Durham County. John Tallmadge clarified that Woodmont is in Durham County, but within Chapel Hill's
81	town boundaries.
82	John Tallmadge and Michael Parker discussed whether funding for the Wake-Durham Commuter
83	Rail project now includes funding for construction from 2028. John Tallmadge stated that the updated
84	cost-sharing split would initially consist of Durham County covering 81.5% of the cost for the Durham-
85	Orange Light Rail Transit (D-O LRT) project, Orange County covering 16.5%, and 2% coming from private
86	donations. John Tallmadge also reviewed the timeline for modifying the cost-sharing split in the plans.
87	John Tallmadge stated that GoTriangle would work with Durham and Wake County to form
88	private/public partnerships, and consult with other entities such as the Research Triangle Foundation, to
89	pursue additional funding for the Wake-Durham Commuter Rail project.

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Barry Jacobs thanked the DCHC MPO Members, GoTriangle staff, and the county staffs for their work on updating the plans. Barry Jacobs stated that a four-year review of the cost sharing agreement was now built into the plans to make sure that it is equitable to both parties. Barry Jacobs commented that Orange and Durham Counties have philosophical, political, and environmental affinities, and will likely continue to work on a wide range of issues such as greenways, parks, and air quality. Barry Jacobs stated that the plans were an example of collaboration and regional thinking.

Vice Chair Damon Seils stated that even though Carrboro would not have rail access, it will reap the benefits directly and indirectly from the adoption of the plans. Vice Chair Damon Seils stated that Carrboro is one of the most transit dependent and transit-oriented communities in the state, and that it was important for them to have a voice in the decision about the plans. Vice Chair Damon Seils reflected on what the rail projects would mean in light of the rapid growth of the region. Vice Chair Damon Seils thanked MPO and GoTriangle staffs for their work developing the plans, especially given that they have received a lot of criticism over the years.

Lydia Lavelle reiterated the points made by Vice Chair Damon Seils, and drew attention to a joint letter from former mayors of Chapel Hill and Carrboro reflecting on transit in the area. Lydia Lavelle also commented on the bold leadership of former leaders who have made transit viable in the area.

130 Ed Harrison reflected on opposition to the D-O LRT and what a high capacity transit system

131 would mean for the region. Ed Harrison commented that he was excited about the idea of getting

132 beyond roads, because it is a central idea of the MPO that it cannot build its way out of congestion. Ed

133 Harrison also commented on the positive environmental impacts of the plan.

134 Michael Parker thanked the County Commissioners responsible for the cost sharing

negotiations, GoTriangle staff, and the county staffs for their work on the plans. Michael Parker cited the

136 plans as an example of regional thinking and action.

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137	Nina Szlosberg-Landis reflected on the progress and setbacks of the D-O LRT. Nina Szlosberg-
138	Landis stated that the D-O LRT was a priority for the governor and his administration, and that the
139	Cooper administration believes that transit and mobility are key to economic development in the region
140	and the state. Nina Szlosberg-Landis stated that NCDOT has tremendous assets that can be deployed to
141	assist in making the D-O LRT happen. Ellen Reckhow and Nina Szlosberg-Landis discussed whether
142	NCDOT was lobbying against the president's budget proposal which would eliminate the New Starts
143	program.
144	Ellen Reckhow inquired whether two motions were needed, one for the plans and one for the
145	cost sharing agreement. John Tallamadge stated that the MPO Board would not be acting on the cost-
146	sharing agreement, but on the two separate plans.
147	Don Moffitt made a motion to grant Pam Hemminger an excused absence. Vice Chair Damon
148	Seils seconded the motion. The motion passed unanimously.
149	Ellen Reckhow made a motion to approve the Durham County Transit Plan as amended to add
150	reference to the Research Triangle Park Service District and include a cash flow table in Appendix A. Don
151	Moffitt seconded the motion. The motion passed unanimously.
152	Ed Harrison made a motion to approve the Orange County Transit Plan as amended to delete
153	specific reference to potential cost cutting measures pertaining to the Hamilton and Woodmont light rail
154	stations. Vice Chair Damon Seils seconded the motion. The motion passed unanimously.
