6. <u>DCHC MPO Wildlife Crossing Planning Study (20 minutes)</u> David Miller, MPO Staff Madeline Galliano, MPO Staff

The Durham-Chapel Hill-Carrboro Metropolitan Planning Organization (DCHC MPO) began developing a wildlife crossing plan for its planning area in early 2024 as part of its safety planning efforts. With guidance from a Core Technical Team of MPO members and stakeholders, MPO staff have been leading this study to identify transportation improvements at wildlife crossing hotspots in the MPO's planning area to help eliminate fatalities and serious injuries associated with wildlife-vehicle crashes, while also helping to protect the natural environment and enhance wildlife connectivity.

The MPO Board released the draft wildlife crossings plan for a 21-day public comment on September 30. MPO staff will present an overview of the public engagement activities, public comment received, and the updated plan for consideration. Documentation for this item includes the MPO's presentation, wildlife crossings plan, public comment received, plan updates made, and a letter of support from the Southern Environmental Law Center.

7. <u>Division Needs Local Point Allocation Update for SPOT 7.0 (10 Minutes)</u> Filmon Fishastion, MPO Staff

On February 27, 2024, the DCHC MPO Board approved the revised Durham-Chapel Hill-Carrboro Metropolitan Planning Organization Methodology for Identifying and Ranking New Transportation Improvement Program Project Requests, which was subsequently approved by the North Carolina Department of Transportation on March 1, 2024. The approved methodology is provided in the attachments for reference in addition to the P7 schedule and funding availability. The approved methodology directs DCHC MPO staff to apply certain criteria to all projects as an initial determination of which projects should receive local points during the Statewide Prioritization Process.

With the release of the Regional Impact funding assignment, all the remaining unfunded projects have been cascaded to the Division Needs level. The current timeline for adoption is as follows:

- October 2: TC met to discuss recommendation
- October 8: TC recommended Board release for public comment
- October 22: Board released for public comment
- November 5: TC recommends Board approval of Division Tier Local Input Point (LIP) assignment
- November 19: Board approves Division Tier LIP assignment
- November 29: LIP due to SPOT Office

The public comment period is open until November 12. To encourage participation, the DCHC MPO website has been updated with a range of resources, along with guidance on key topics to consider, instructions on how to provide feedback, and a map to act as a visual aid. The comments received thus far are attached below.

Amendment #5 to the FY2024-33 Transportation Improvement Program (TIP) continues to modify and add projects from the recent Call for Projects. This amendment also incorporates recently awarded funds such as the Rebuilding American Infrastructure with Sustainability and Equity (RAISE) grant and 5310 funds into both existing and new projects.

As there are projects with changes in excess of \$2 million and 25% from the original amount, per the MPO's Public Involvement Plan (PIP), this amendment will be released for a 21-day public comment period. The current timeline for adoption is as follows:

- November 5: TC recommends Board release for public comment
- November 19: Board releases for public comment
- January 14: TC recommends Board approves amendment
- January 28: Board approves amendment

11. <u>Orange County Short Range Transit Plan (10 minutes)</u> Nish Trivedi, Orange County Transportation Services

Orange County completed the Short Range Transit Plan (SRTP) following a year long planning process that included two (2) rounds of public engagement, multiple pop-up events such as local Farmer's Markets, and other public events. The SRTP effort started in November 2023 with the first round of public engagement completed in March 2024 and the second round completed early September 2024. 12. <u>Orange County Safe Routes to Schools Plan (10 minutes)</u> Nish Trivedi, Orange County Transportation Services

The 2014 Orange County Safe Routes to School Action Plan was updated with public involvement, field investigation and extensive analysis. This update includes and is not limited to:

- Planning level analysis of existing transportation around schools
- · All Orange County public schools
- Youth involvement in the planning process
- · Implementation STBG, TAP and others

The Existing Conditions Analysis involved a comprehensive field study of each Orange County public school, focusing on a 2-mile radius around the school property. Orange County Transportation Service hosted a virtual public meeting with all the school principals and administration in accordance with the approved Scope of Work, Chapter 3 in the plan.

Some of the key highlights of the plan include:

• Students walking and cycling to school include - Orange Middle and High School, Hillsborough Elementary, Efland Cheeks Global Elementary, Gravely Hill Middle, River Park Elementary, Pathways Elementary, and Cedar Ridge High School

- · Crosswalks at intersections and mid-block crosswalks near schools
- · Reduced speed zones and other traffic calming measures
- · Extending sidewalks to rural areas and filling in gaps in urban areas
- Multi-use Paths and Greenways along major corridors and some secondary roads

The County's Transportation Advisory Service and Orange Unified Transportation Board recommended the SRTP be approved by the Board of County Commissioners.

13. <u>Orange County Transportation Multimodal Plan (10 minutes)</u> Nish Trivedi, Orange County Transportation Services

WSP and Orange County have completed the County's Transportation Multimodal Plan (TMP). It focuses on the unincorporated portions of Orange County and consolidates all approved transportation related plans, projects and programs into a single plan. Public Involvement: Website launch (April 3), Promotional outreach (April 9), Public survey (April 9 - May 3): https://www.surveyhero.com/c/OrangeCtyTMP, and Public Meetings (April 23 and 25)

A unique County specific prioritization methodology (Attachment 2) was created to help organize all the projects and determine - analytically - in what order they should be pursued. This unique Orange County Prioritization honors the goals and objectives documented in the approved plans like the two Metropolitan Transportation Plan and three Comprehensive Transportation Plans in Orange County. It also takes into account those documented in locally adopted plans like the County's Strategic Plan, and Access Management Plans. OCTS staff worked with local town staff to ensure the TMP is focused on the unincorporated portions of the county. The OCTS Director presented this plan on July 10th and August 19th to the Orange Unified Transportation (OUTBoard) and collected feedback. All feedback has been incorporated into the plan.

TC Action: Recommend MPO Board approve the Orange County Transportation Multimodal Plan.
